A great deal of skill, care and detail goes into creating a new Royal Star & Garter Home. Close attention is paid to making a homely environment for every resident. Lori **Pinkerton-Rolet of Park Grove** Design explains the thinking behind the High Wycombe interior design.

What were the inspirations behind the interior design?

In line with the beautiful new architecture, the interior of this Home will be more contemporary. Park Grove is taking inspiration from nature to add warmth to the schemes by providing different textured finishes and lots of wood. We've also been working to create a wide variety of atmospheres across the Home to suit differing situations and moods.

How do you make the larger spaces seem homely?

We break large areas into smaller ones through furniture layouts which create comfortable seating areas to encourage conversation and provide quiet personal 'nooks' as well as spaces for gathering with families and

friends. Accessories such as cushions, artwork and warm low-level table lighting are also essential.

What are the challenges you face when designing such a range of spaces?

We're blessed in High Wycombe with many different types of spaces to design. We are aware that not everyone has the same tastes so by using a range of styling and colours in each space we hope there will be somewhere in which everyone can feel comfortable and at home.

What are the challenges in designing rooms for people living with dementia?

The research related to dementia design is constantly updated so the learning never stops! Colour choices and contrasts are of critical importance, so furniture might differ strongly in colour from the walls to clarify each object, while floor colour contrasts must be minimised to allow someone living with dementia to feel the floor is safe and level. Bright colours stimulate the brain and it is important to create opportunities for interaction between people and interesting objects in their surroundings.

How do you make each bedroom feel individual?

We are making several bedroom schemes for each floor with additional schemes for dementia care bedrooms. The room doors will be timber but coloured panels will add colour to the hallway and make finding an individual room easier. The room shapes change throughout the building so furnishing layouts and window treatments will differ.

Dear Supporter,

Welcome to the spring edition of Connections. On 14 January we celebrated Founders' Day and the start of our 101st year. I wanted to take this opportunity to update you on a few activities that the Charity will be progressing during 2017.

In High Wycombe, the construction of the structural frame of our new four-storey Home is complete. We are busy developing lots of local contacts and already have a number of enquiries from people who wish to move in. We held a launch event in High Wycombe in March and aim to be 'topping out' the building over the summer. We remain on track to open our doors to 74 new residents around Easter 2018.

Our Solihull Home has been open for nearly ten years so it is time to refresh the wonderful environment we have already in place. We are planning to redesign the Dining Room and Café-Bar later this year, and have received a welcome grant, funded by the Chancellor using LIBOR funds, towards the costs.

In January, I had the pleasure of opening the newly refurbished 'old' Richmond Home. Although no longer our property, there is so much history and great memories linked with the building. The Chapel in the building will remain accessible to the public and I am delighted that we have agreed with the new owners to hold a couple of services there every year.

We are working increasingly with a range of other military charities and academic bodies to share our knowledge and help raise standards, particularly linked to dementia care. Pauline Shaw, our Director of Care, has recently been appointed by NICE (the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence) to develop national guidelines on assessing and supporting people living with dementia in care settings. Our ethos has always been to deliver excellence in our own Homes, but I am very pleased that we are also actively helping others to aim high with the care that they provide.

We are extremely privileged to have received a gift from The Patron's Fund, the charitable project set up to acknowledge the work of the charitable organisations for which Her Majesty The Queen acts as a Patron, on the occasion of her 90th birthday. The gift recognises the Charity's work supporting disabled veterans and their spouses.

We also owe a huge thanks to our friends at The Birmingham International Tattoo, Solihull Rotary Club and Squires Garden Centre – Long Ditton, and the many supporters who offer their time and skills to raise funds for the veterans in our care.




Centenary Book

The Royal Star & Garter Homes has cared for thousands of disabled ex-Service people, and their spouses, over the past 100 years. This is possible thanks to the generosity of our supporters who remember our residents with a gift in their Will.

Our specialist care has developed over the years to meet the changing needs of our residents. Today's state-of-theart Homes provide specialist dementia care and 24-hour nursing care in a modern, homely environment, continuing the legacy of care that began in 1916 when the first Home opened its doors to severely injured young Servicemen returning from the First World War.

The Charity's ethos of providing exceptional care remains at the heart of everything we do. We still rely on your support and gifts in Wills remain vital in helping to fund life-enhancing care for our residents.

Making a Will is the only way to ensure the people you care about are provided for in the future. We understand that when making or reviewing your Will, family and loved ones come first. However, we hope that you will consider making a gift to The Royal Star & Garter Homes, to help us to continue caring for disabled veterans.

By 2020, it is estimated that 115,000 veterans will require residential and nursing care, and 40,000 will be living with dementia. A gift in your Will can help us to be here for all those ex-Service people who will need our help in the years ahead.

Frank's Story

Navy veteran Frank lives with dementia in one of our Homes, where he loves to dress smartly and enjoys being sociable.

Frank remembers life in West London during the Second World War. He was evacuated to Hertfordshire but ran away back to London. His older brother, Jimmy, was a radio controller on the Lancaster bombers during the War, which Frank remembers and he often talks about Jimmy.

Frank himself served in the Royal Navy after the War ended, for two years from 1945. He served on HMS Tyne, achieving the rank of Petty Officer. After the War, he worked for the Post Office and in the Civil Service until his retirement in 1985.

Even though Frank lives with dementia, many of his old pastimes remain a comfort to him and music especially unlocks memories. Frank loves listening to Irish music to reconnect him to his Irish roots – as does enjoying a glass of stout. He often attends the many concerts and live music events at the Home. He's an animal lover, so fussing our PAT dog and other animal visitors is soothing. He enjoys family visits and is very proud to be a great grandfather.

His daughter Sue commented: "Dad loved life; he enjoyed his time doing National Service in the Navy and then his career in the Civil Service. He was a devoted husband and

continues, in his own way, to show us all the love which we have come to accept as natural to him. The Royal Star & Garter Homes offers the very best care in a situation which none of us would choose and means Dad can live with the dignity he has shown all his life."
