Amy's 100th birthday

WWII veteran Amy marked her centenary in January.



In 1942, aged just 17, Amy joined the Women's Auxiliary Air Force, training to operate barrage

balloons. She then worked near Hastings as a plotter.

Amy celebrated her 100th birthday with lunch, afternoon tea and a garden room party at our Surbiton Home with her family, including grandsons from abroad. Daughter Kim said: "Mum enjoyed her parties. The Home made it special for her."

The enchanted garden

Staff in our Surbiton Home have created an indoor garden, designed to attract and comfort residents living with dementia.

The garden creates an inviting sanctuary where residents can rest and take a break. Staff understand how important it is for them to have moments of peace. Sensory elements calm space bring the outdoors in, with

Reaching into the community

We have found that our services in the community impact people in many different ways – often deeply personal and far-reaching.

Les's story

Our free Telephone Friendship Service (TFS) has already reached 67 veterans and their partners nationally. Volunteers provide conversation, support and companionship.

One user, Les, 64, said the TFS had helped boost his confidence enough to publish his autobiography in 2024. The Falklands veteran praised the TFS for "giving him his voice back."

His memoir covers his time as a nurse on the hospital ship SS Uganda in 1982, treating burns casualties. Les developed post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and has been unable to work for the past four years, leaving him depressed.

He said the TFS was a catalyst to bring meaning back into his life: "It has given me confidence, it certainly gave me the confidence to write my book."



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Having someone to talk to, bounce ideas off and have a chat with, gives me comfort and support. It gives me companionship.

Romayne's story

Our Lunch Clubs welcome veterans and their partners from the community

into the Homes to enjoy meals, activities and companionship. Last year we supported 119 veterans or partners. Movingly, the service is helping one widow to grieve.

Romayne is a Lunch Club volunteer at Solihull. She says the service has helped her adjust to life following the death of husband Paul, who was a resident.

"I used to come to visit Paul regularly with our Labrador, Bella, and when he died in 2022 I really missed my visits to the Home."

Romayne was encouraged to stay in touch and, when Lunch Club launched in 2023, she decided to join in. She said: "I like meeting people and spending time with them. I really enjoy my role because I feel like I'm helping others.

Lunch Club has helped me grieve. I've found coming

Our Wellbeing programme helps residents to explore new skills and revive old ones.

Artist Anne has been painting all her life, inheriting her passion from her mother. Anne, who is living with dementia in our Surbiton Home, has an easel set up in her room and enjoys spending time painting the view from the window and family portraits.



She said, "I didn't go to art college, but I did go to evening school, and I've been painting all my life. It's an enjoyable pastime, but I wouldn't say it's relaxing – it can be infuriating! But when it turns out well it's smashing!

It's lovely when people say nice things about my paintings because I can be my own worst critic and often don't see it myself."

In High Wycombe, staff recently held an exhibition featuring the work of resident Michael (far right), an Army veteran who served for 31 years. He took up painting and sketching soon after retiring in 1982, and is self-taught. Over 60 pieces of art, made before

and during his time at the Home, were displayed, drawing praise from fellow residents and staff. Michael is now living with dementia, and his daughter Sarah said, "Painting and sketching has been such an enjoyable and therapeutic part

of my dad's life. I love the fact that at the age

of 94 he is still encouraged to be creative and stay connected to his earlier life."

Brian, (right) 91, served in the Royal Artillery for his National Service, and comes to our Solihull Home for Day Care. He has been sketching all his life and, 30 years ago, started making ceramics and



figures from metal ingots. He was also a keen photojournalist, with articles

published in several national magazines. Brian said, "I come to the Home because of all the activities – the entertainment, exercise and of course the crafts. Even though I'm the ripe old age of 91, I can come here and still do the things that I love and that I've done for many years."

A chat with Bill



In this feature, we ask one of our residents what's on their mind. Here, Bill tells us what matters to him.



Bill was a Navigator in the RAF, where he served for more than 30 years, attaining the rank of Squadron Leader.

Previously a farmer, he now has great concerns for our environment.



I think the Home is absolutely marvellous. I've never met such a caring group of people in all my life.

What advice would you give to your younger self?

I should have believed in myself more.
I wish I had more confidence and had gone for a permanent commission in the RAF a lot earlier than I did.

How could you personally have been better supported as a veteran?

I've never felt the need to be supported but I welcome veterans' organisations that are out there that can support people who require it. I think the Veterans' ID is a good idea, because my other ID, such as passport and driver's licence, have expired.

What are you most proud of?

I'm very proud of my time in the RAF, and in particular for winning a prestigious navigation competition in 1963. And I'm very proud of my family and my sons.

What are you passionate about?

As someone who loves gardening, nature and wildlife, I'm passionate about the environment and looking after it. I'm very concerned about this business of climate change and global warming. No one seems to be doing anything about it, and we're heading deeper into trouble. When you think about the changing weather patterns we're experiencing now, it's a bit frightening, and I worry it will only get worse.

Fundraising friends
