

Resident receives highest French honour for WW2 Service

France's highest military honour has been bestowed on Army veteran, Arthur Ogden.

The prestigious Legion d'honneur medal was presented to Arthur for his contribution to the liberation of France during the Second World War. Arthur joined the Army in 1939 and served as a driver in the Signal Unit for the 1st Armoured Brigade. His regiment was attached to the Royal Dragoons and served in Europe and North Africa.



Solihull Home chosen for Teaching Care Homes Programme

This ground-breaking, nurses-led project focusses on developing centres of excellence where staff are supported in meaningful and innovative learning environments.

The objective of the scheme is to raise the profile of residential care within the nursing community. The Home will receive support over the next two years via workshops and one-to-one staff mentoring.

Pauline Shaw, Director of Care, commented, "We aspire to offer exceptional care to every single one of our residents and can only do this with exceptional staff. It's more than just clinical skills and knowledge; equally important is our nursing and care team's passionate approach to the care of older people. We will be able to nurture and develop all those skills by being part of such an innovative project. I'm excited to see the outcomes and how they can benefit not only our organisation, but the care sector as a whole."

The project is run by Care England in partnership with the foundation of Nursing Studies and the Burdett Trust for Nursing.



Being a Butterfly

Nine members of staff recently completed the Dementia Care Matters 'Being a Butterfly' Learning Programme.

The course spans ten one-day workshops and focusses on supporting people with dementia. The programme examines what 'quality of life' means to those around us including people living with dementia. It then offers practical tools and methods staff can use to improve the lives of residents. Subjects covered include nurturing relationships, nutrition, communication, understanding behaviour and sensory approaches including the importance of touch.

Learning and Development Manager, Malcolm Brown, commented, "Having worked in health and social care, I thought I knew about dementia. I realise now that I didn't know as much as I thought. This course has showed me that emotional validation is OK and a valued form of engagement. It's taught me about having confidence, that there is no need to rehearse a conversation. You can go with it, pick up an object and talk about it with a resident."

Housekeeper Lorraine commented, "The course has been great fun and such an eye opener. It's given me permission to be myself around the residents – I know that it's OK to give a hug and have a chat."

Spitfire Hero shares his story for RAF100

To celebrate the centenary of the RAF, resident Phillip Johnson shares his account of life as a pilot during the Second World War.

Phillip volunteered for the RAF on his 18th birthday and underwent the demanding Spitfire pilot training.

He joined the 185 Malta Squadron where his duties were to assist the 8th Army to drive the Germans up through Italy. This campaign was peppered with incidents, the Spitfires were equipped with bombs and called up by the Army to flush out hidden Panzer Tanks.

On one occasion Phillip was flying 'Tail-End Charlie' at the rear of the Squadron. He recalls: "There was a lot

of flak coming from the ground as we swooped in to attack the tanks and make off over the sea. When I landed, my mechanic pointed out a great big hole in the rear fuselage. It would have been a different story if it had hit me or the fuel tank."

In 1944 he was moved to Holland to fly Typhoons with rocket-launchers to target the German barges. On one flight his engine failed and he remembers: "...looking for a field to crash land. My plane broke up and caught fire, I was driven back to my Squadron where my CO sent me straight back up flying."

Phillip says of his war years: "It's what we had to do, so we just did it."

However, one memory always lights up his eyes when he recalls the time when Doreen, a WAAF, walked into the Pilots' Mess. "That's the girl for me," he said and they were happily married for 66 years.





Celebrating 100 Years of the RAF

On 1 April 2018, the RAF celebrated 100 years since its formation. The Royal Star & Garter Homes has been privileged to care for many RAF veterans in its 102-year history.

The Charity has close links to many RAF organisations and supports those residents who want to keep in touch. These relationships help veterans to reconnect with their military past and the comrades who were so important to them during their service.

The Royal Air Force Association, RAF Halton and RAF High Wycombe, several RAF military bands and The Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund all support the Charity in various ways and their generosity helps to improve the lives of residents living in our Homes.

Military Connections

Most of our ex-Service residents enjoy maintaining their military connections. We look for a range of ways to keep these links alive for the residents and many organisations support us in this valuable work.

Military Visits

Understanding how important it is to our residents, the Charity places special emphasis on military links. We seek support from many organisations to hold military-themed outings, activities and programmes, such as the Royal Naval Association who gave iPads to the residents and provided training to help them keep in touch with family.

Every Christmas, the Royal Air Force Association visits the Homes to share some festive cheer with residents. RAF bands regularly perform at the Homes for special occasions and we have strong connections with RAF Halton and RAF High Wycombe.

Residents enjoy military-themed trips to museums, parades or visits from Forces bands and cadets. Concerts included 'VE Day' with the Lest We Forget Association, Armed Forces Day celebrations with The Royal Signals Band and The Royal British Legion Surbiton Youth Band and a trip to The Birmingham International Tattoo. A visit from a Ferret Scout car and two WW1 jeeps proved popular, as was a visit from Surrey Military Collectors' Society which brought together two long-lost friends.

Trusts Support



David Offield, a member of care staff at Surbiton, has undertaken a cycle ride over 1,000km from the Surbiton Home through northern France to raise funds for the Charity.




His aim is to fund a motion-activated projector which stimulates memory, reasoning and recall, promotes well-being and offers a means of measuring changes in cognitive ability.
