The Royal Star & Garter Homes

We provide award-winning care for veterans and their partners who live with disability or dementia, in state-of-theart Homes. The Charity was founded in 1916 to care for the severely injured men returning from the battlegrounds of the First World War. Today, we provide specialist nursing, dementia and therapeutic care, together with a varied and engaging programme of activities, which enable residents to remain independent and enjoy life.

YOUR SUPPORT

- Provide residential care for 197 residents, including 71 people living with dementia
- Offer over 50 activities per week in each Home
- Welcome Trainee Nursing Associates to placements at Surbiton and student military nurses to Solihull
- Complete our Home in High Wycombe
- Keep our Homes refurbished and comfortable
- Employ 267 staff who provide loving and compassionate care and support to residents
- Run a Day Care service, the Star & Garter Club, at the Solihull Home which provides 2,000 sessions per year
- Offer opportunities for around 80 volunteers

We believe that people really make a care home. Residents, staff, volunteers and relatives all play a part in creating our very special military family. As we welcome the first residents to our **new Home in High Wycombe**, Manager Chelle Daly explains what makes it a wonderful place to live.

66 What qualities do you look for in your staff?

I look for warmth and a passion for care of older people, someone that will go that extra mile to make a difference. I'm delighted with my new staff. Their enthusiasm and genuine love shone through during their assessments. A sense of humour is hugely important too because caring can be hard and laughter is the best medicine when things are tough. It's important to share a laugh with our residents too.

You have a magnificent building to work in. How do you make it a home?

We want the residents to make it their home because it is their home. The magic comes from the love, compassion and companionship we offer. And, of course, comfort and choice. We encourage residents to bring their beloved belongings to put in their rooms if they wish, to make it their space where they can welcome visitors or enjoy quiet time. The café-bar, activities room, library and garden offer space to socialise and join in our amazing activities.



How do you make it homely?

The Home is a family environment, there are no uniforms, no visiting hours. It's important to create a warm, relaxed, lovely atmosphere where everybody – residents, relatives and the team – are cared for and supported to make the most out of every day.

The Home is ready to open. Are you excited?

I don't think I can put into words how excited I am to get in there with my wonderful team and use our skills and love to turn the building into a real home as we welcome our very first residents.

Incouraging our residents to enjoy expressing themselves helps to improve their well-being and quality of life. Arts and crafts promote creativity, boost self-esteem and provide a sense of accomplishment. These are all qualities we believe should be supported at every stage of life.

Each of our Homes has a dedicated team which offers an exciting programme of activities.

Charlie, our Solihull Activities Manager, organises four different art and crafts sessions each week, recognising that they help mobility and memory, while also rekindling forgotten talents. She said: "Our residents really benefit from these activities. It helps them focus and relax, it lowers the heart rate, it's good for hand-eye coordination and it's really important for well-being."

"I think everyone has a certain amount of creativity in them," comments
Rosemarie Swinfield, a volunteer who helps in the arts and crafts classes on offer to all residents.
She believes inclusiveness is important: "You don't have to be a great artist to enjoy the benefits. Some of the art is very special, some is simple, but someone has done it and that's an achievement."

Raquel, Activities Manager at Surbiton, sees that art benefits all residents, especially those living with dementia: "Art enables residents to stay connected to who they really are without having to use words or explain to anyone. It's important because it helps them to maintain their identity and creativity. Art is an intimate medium to express feelings."

Art also filters through other daily activities and outings, which include decorating bird feeders or plant pots, sharing art books, or visiting galleries. Crafting hobbies, woodwork and gardening are also beneficial. Working with clay improves dexterity, while crafts like sewing and knitting allow residents to focus, share and reminisce.


