- launch a trial to provide support to people in the local community and in their own homes;
- restart our Day Care service in Solihull and High Wycombe and launch it in Surbiton, in 2023;
- develop and roll out a veteran-friendly framework that will help provide additional support to veterans living in care homes across the country.

On behalf of our residents, staff and volunteers, our Chair, Major General Tim Tyler, paid tribute to our late Queen and Patron:

Her Majesty The Queen's role as our Patron was just one aspect of a reign characterised by support for good causes and devotion to public service.

Queen Elizabeth II became our Patron in 1953, following the death of her grandmother, Queen Mary.

As a veteran herself, Queen Elizabeth had a natural affinity with our residents.

In 2021, Emrys received a British Empire Medal for services to veterans during Covid-19 in The Queen's New Year's Honours List.

The Army veterans met through their children in 1980 – Fred's son Pete married Stan's daughter Jayne – and they have been great friends ever since. Jayne said her dad and father-in-law are thrilled to be together: "Our parents met 42 years ago and have been friends ever since."

Solihull Wellbeing Coordinator Mary described it as an "absolute joy" to see the two together. She said: "You can see there's a genuine friendship there, they're more like brothers. They share a close bond and it's lovely to watch."



She had a successful career as a school bursar. A keen golfer and dog lover, she was very sociable with a packed diary until her final days.

Our laundry experts

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I remember how hard it was to do the washing for my own family – they do an amazing job getting everyone's clothes washed the very same day. Amy, WAAF veteran

Behind the scenes in our comfortable Homes, staff work hard to keep life running smoothly for our residents.

Our laundry team takes pride in its work, and the care it gives the residents is sweetly scented!

"Without laundry there would be no clean bedding, no towels to dry the residents, and no clean clothes for them to wear, so I think what I do is very important – I think of laundry as the heart of the Home," Sharon, part of the team in High Wycombe, explained.

Every day across our Homes, hundreds of items of clothing are collected, washed, dried, ironed and returned to residents. This job falls to the Housekeeping Teams, and specifically to staff working in the laundry. They launder many other items daily, including bedding, towels, tablecloths and napkins.

In Surbiton, Zac says he is dedicated to doing the best for residents. "They like the clothes that they wear," he said. "They expect their laundry to be washed properly, and we return it to them the same day. I put my heart into doing that. We do everything we can."

Sharon agrees: "We all like to take pride in ourselves and how we look, and what we wear is a big part of that. I think this is especially so in our Homes. Residents' military links mean they take special pride in being well presented, and wearing clothes which are cleaned and ironed. I know that being smart makes them happy. It's all part of the person-centred care we provide."

Like all of our staff, the laundry team puts the individual's needs at the heart of its work.

Our Homes are also geared to meet the needs of residents who have allergies, or preferences about how their clothes are washed.

In Solihull, a member of the Housekeeping Team repairs and alters clothes, which is very much appreciated by residents.

All clothes are given a tag which is unique to the resident, to make sure every item of clothing gets back to the correct owner. Lead Housekeeper Carmel said: "I don't want missing clothes. It does happen occasionally because all of us are human, but we want to avoid it."

Janine, in Solihull, said: "Some residents get anxious about not having their clothes with them. It's important to them and to me that we get them back to their owners the same day."
